

FUND STRATEGY

The Fund uses a bottom-up selection process based on fundamental security analysis, and does not try to replicate a benchmark. The approach is contrarian and value oriented. The Fund seeks to find securities that are depressed in price, out of favor with investors, and trading at a substantial discount to intrinsic value. The portfolio manager emphasizes free cash flow generation, balance sheet quality, and the fundamental strength of a business franchise as attributes to identify the most attractive risk/reward propositions across all market capitalizations. The Fund focuses primarily on the securities of U.S. issuers, but frequently invests in non-U.S. issuers. The portfolio will typically contain 60-80 positions.

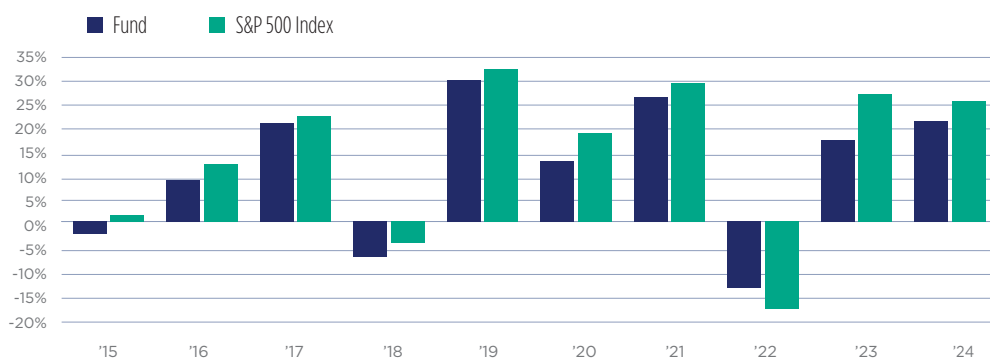

QUARTERLY UPDATE

- In the first quarter U.S. equity markets fell sharply. Uncertainty in the U.S. seemed to spark a capital outflow as Europe, China and many emerging markets outperformed the U.S. The top contributing sectors to the S&P 500 were healthcare, financials and energy while technology, consumer discretionary and communication services were detractors.
- Materials, energy, and healthcare were the strongest contributing sectors to The Tocqueville Fund (the "Fund"), while technology, industrials and communication services were the weakest. The Fund's investments in Newmont, Wheaton Precious Metals, Texas Pacific Land, Republic Services and Sony led the Fund's performance, while investments in Marvell Technologies, Rocket Labs, NVIDIA, Alphabet, and ServiceNow were the biggest detractors.
- During the quarter, the Fund purchased AeroVironment Inc., a company which sells drones and related software. Shares of AeroVironment Inc. fell as peace negotiations to end the Russia-Ukraine war continue, and on fears it may be the target of government spending cuts, and that its merger with BlueHalo LLC might not close. We believed the company fits with core priorities of the US Department of Defense, the merger was likely to proceed, and the impact from Ukraine was already reflected in the share price.
- The Fund also purchased United Healthcare, the leading health insurer. The managed care sector had fallen on concerns about the new Trump Administration's healthcare policies, several scandals involving denial of patient coverage and general outcry over rising premiums and difficulty navigating the healthcare system. In our view, the controversies were overblown and, as valuations had declined, the risk/reward tradeoff became favorable.
- Other new positions include Regeneron, Uber and Genuine Parts. We also added to existing positions in Adobe, Amazon, Marvell, and Vertiv. Several positions were sold outright, including Flex, Johnson & Johnson, Nike, Novo-Nordisk and Disney. Others were trimmed, including AbbVie, Apple, Crane, NVIDIA, Paccar, Sony, and Walmart.

The Tocqueville Fund's investment objective is long-term capital appreciation.

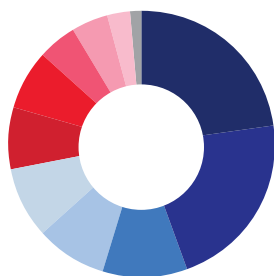

GLOSSARY OF TERMS

P/E: The weighted average of the price/earnings (P/E) ratios of the equity securities referenced. The P/E ratio is calculated by dividing the current price of the stock by the trailing earnings per share for the past 12 months.

The S&P 500 Index is a market-value weighted index consisting of 500 stocks chosen for market size, liquidity, and industry group representation. You cannot invest directly in an index.

The Russell 1000® Value Index measures the performance of the large-cap value segment of the U.S. equity universe. It includes those Russell 1000® companies with lower price-to-book ratios and lower expected growth values.

The Morningstar Large-Blend Portfolios are fairly representative of the overall U.S. stock market in size, growth rates, and price. Stocks in the top 70% of the capitalization of the U.S. equity market are defined as large-cap. The blend style is assigned to portfolios where neither growth nor value characteristics predominate.
